POST OPERATIVE/HOME INSTRUCTIONS Following Spine Surgery

- **Please call our office the day of your release from the hospital to schedule a post-operative appointment. If you do not already have an appointment scheduled, you should be seen 7-10 days after a decompression/laminectomy and 10-14 days after a spinal fusion.
- **Please call the office if any of the following occur:
 Persistent fever (> 101 degrees) or chills
 Drainage/redness/pus or increased swelling of incision
 Worsening pain
 Loss of control of your bladder or bowels
 Any symptoms that cause you to worry
- **YOU MUST KEEP YOUR WOUND CLEAN AND DRY. Change dressing daily or every other day. Keep it clean and dry. Sponge baths or showers are okay, if the wound is covered with a waterproof dressing (i.e. saran wrap and tape). No baths until incision is completely healed. The bandage may be removed or replaced with dry sterile gauze pads 3 days following surgery or daily after. Leave steri strips across the incision intact.
- **If a brace is prescribed, wear it as instructed.
- ** <u>Restrictions</u> after surgery are as follows: No pushing or pulling, bending, twisting, reaching, or lifting over 10lbs. for 3 weeks after a decompression/laminectomy and 3 months after a lumbar fusion. You may walk, use stairs or ride in a car as you feel comfortable. You should not drive until you are released to do so; you should not drive while taking pain narcotics. Ask at your first post-operative visit.
- **Constipation is a very common problem following surgical procedures and taking narcotics. **The key is prevention!!** It is recommended to take a stool softener (docusate sodium, Colace or Kaopectate) while using narcotics. Make sure you are drinking plenty of fluids and eating lots of fiber. *Mild constipation:* In addition to a stool softener, you may use a gentle laxative (Miralax, Dulcolax, Correctol or Senokot) daily until you have a bowel movement. **Severe Constipation:** If you have tried the above, you may use a rectal suppository, enema or powder (GoLytely, magnesium citrate or a Fleet enema) and may need to do this more than once. If none of the above is successful, then you should go to the emergency room. REMEMBER: only use laxatives if you are passing gas.
- **If you have had a FUSION, you should NOT take NSAID medications (Ibuprofen, Aleve, Celebrex, Voltaren, Daypro, ect.) for 3 months and getting x-rays in our office. Ask the doctor when it is okay to restart these medications.
- **No dental cleanings or procedures for 4-6 months after operation. If you have an emergent dental need, call the office and discuss with us in advance.

PLEASE NOTE: PLAN AHEAD AND DO NOT WAIT UNTIL YOU HAVE COMPLETELY EXHAUSTED YOUR SUPPLY OF MEDICATION BEFORE CALLING. *NARCOTICS CANNOT BE CALLED IN* AND YOU WILL NEED TO PLAN ACCORDINGLY. ROUTINE PRESCRIPTION REFILLS WILL NOT BE MADE AFTER NORMAL OFFICE HOURS.
